

A lot of events have taken place in our Circuit since Autumn.

The celebrations of Advent, Christmas and entry into the New Year were much anticipated occasions joyfully celebrated in church congregations throughout the Circuit.

We said goodbye to Daphne as Circuit Administrator. Daphne has served the Circuit very well indeed in this role for approximately 13 years and felt the time had come to retire. We will continue to see Daphne in Circuit as she remains a member of Trinity Methodist Church.

Then at the end of April we will sadly be saying 'Thank you' and 'Farewell' to Revd Yemi who will be starting his 3-month sabbatical and then retiring in August. A farewell service will be held at 3pm on Sunday 23rd April at Grays MC. All are invited. You can read a splendid article which Revd. Yemi shares some thoughts and experiences of his ministry elsewhere in this edition.

We have welcomed Hannah Harris as our new Circuit Administrator. Hannah is a Methodist who lives and worships in the Southend-on-Sea Circuit.

In September we will be joined in Circuit by Revd. Fiona Smith who will replace Revd. Yemi as Minister with oversight for Grays, Stanford-le-Hope, Linford and Horndon-on-the-Hill in the Thurrock section of our Circuit.

Revd. Fiona is a probationer Minister. This will be her first ministerial appointment. I hope that we will warmly welcome Revd. Fiona not only on 'her patch' but right around the Circuit in ways that will ensure a positive and pleasant beginning in what we pray will be a long and enriching time of ministry. A Welcome service for Revd. Fiona will be held on Thursday 31st August, 7.30pm, at Linford MC. All are invited.

In November, I had an experience of attending 3-Generate for the first time. 3-Gen is a wonderful, creative and fun discipleship opportunity for young people and ultimately for our churches too. I would strongly encourage all churches to consider how we might promote this with our young people



and hopefully take a group from the Circuit to this event which this year will happen between 6th and 8th October at the NEC in Birmingham. Last year's event sold out and whilst they have increased capacity this year they are expecting to sell out once again. Ticket sales will open on 17th April and close on 21st July.

As I mentioned previously, there is funding for all who wish to attend – both for the young people and the adults accompanying. Please get in touch with your Minister, steward or myself, if you would like to explore this further.

As we begin this season of Lent, I hope that in whatever you give up or take up, as a way of expressing your journey through these 40 days, you may be inspired by the example of Jesus and enjoy a closer walk with him.

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Thanksgiving At Stanford-le-Hope



At the end of September, we had a Thanksgiving Service at Stanford-le-Hope before the Church closed for worship. Here is a bit of historical memory of the church.

It is interesting that the population of the village in 1801 was 249, rising steadily to 1,715 in 1901 and 5,000 in 1945. Today in 2022 it is 29,000.

Although the followers of Wesley were undoubtably at work in SLH there was nothing on record until a missionary crossed the river Thames from Gravesend to Tilbury and onto Leigh. Our village was on the main coach route, so the missionary frequently visited SLH and stayed with Mr. Jeremiah Butler, the father of Methodism in the village.

In 1835 morning and evening services were held in a cottage which stood on the Corringham Road at the junction with Billet Lane. The Society class met in the cottage next door every Sunday afternoon. Those who gathered there over the next sixteen years had an ambition to build a chapel in the village. They asked Mr. Allen, the baker who was erecting a cart shed if they could hire it for preaching the Gospel. To their amassment he built them a little brick chapel. After a Wednesday evening prayer meeting, Mr. Butler led the members to building which was in the process of being built so they consecrate the chapel which was opened in 1851. The Sandpits chapel church family was increasing rapidly so the soon required a larger building. The site where our church now stands was given by David Beckworth and on



the 7th September 1869, a foundation stone was laid with the new church being opened in the following year.

In1920 funds were started for an extension and for an organ. Over the next two years fundraising brought in £529 so in 1923 the extension was added and the organ was installed in 1928 and in 1928 the oil lamps were replaced by electric lighting. There was a close relationship between the local Parish Church, St Margaret's and the SLH Methodist church so when the Parish Church re-cast their bells the Methodist Church added a new bell with the inscription "To the glory of God and an expression of the Unity in Devotion to our Lord and Mastger Jesus Christ from the Methodist Church in this Parish".

During WW2 young people from the Church family were called to the armed forces. Unfortunately, Mr. Evelyn Key and RAF Pilot made the supreme sacrifice whilst others became prisoners of war. In 1940 an air raid shelter was added to the church building. Which provided shelter for around 50 people. During the war many services people stationed nearby were welcomed to SLH services and church parades.

After the war it was hoped that there would be a new church building but instead the church was again extended to provide indoor toilets. The Youth Hall was built from an old wooden hut bought from Aveley Methodist church and transported to SLH on Charlie Key's coal lorry. This was replaced in 1976 by the present structure which provides storage as well as a lot of community use.

In the church building pews were replaced with chairs including the choir area and a new glass organ screen was fitted along with a modern staircase and a new gas boiler was installed.

Today, the church family has said 'Goodbye' to the church building and moved to Hassenbrook Academy where we have the use of their school hall for our worship. So, another chapter in the mission of the Stanford le Hope Methodist church has begun.

Reflection on Horndon The Hill Methodist Church

Hello, my name is lan and I thought I'd contribute an article to the Circuit newsletter. it was suggested that I might like to write on some ways in which members of Methodist Churches in the Circuit are sharing with another church in the area.

In 2013 Zion Hall Mission, an Interdenominational Church in neighbouring village of Bulphan, was unable to continue holding services twice on a Sunday and decided to meet only in the evening. Two members of that church decided to come along to Horndon Methodist in the morning and later became members. Some five years later at Horndon it was decided that evening services would be discontinued and as a result there are now three members who each Sunday attend Horndon Methodist in the morning and Zion Hall Mission in the evening.

Over the years other members from Horndon and Stanford Le Hope Methodist churches have attended and led services at Zion Hall Mission. These include Maureen McPherson, our current Minister Rev Yemi who regularly preaches there and our former Minister Rev Brenda. The Mission looks forward to having Rev Brenda take the Carol Service on 18th December at 6:30pm (all are welcome to that service).

In July this year the two churches were able to work together to host a speaker from Arab World Ministries at both the morning and evening services. This arrangement allowed him to commit to travelling from the south coast and meant that folk in South Essex to be able to hear first-hand the news of this Christian work.

Members from Horndon have been able to help in other ways too. These have included giving advice and sharing experience particularly during the early days of the Covid 19 pandemic and more recently on experience with banking arrangements. In addition, help has been given on such practical matters as contacts for electrical testing.

Finally, as Stanford Methodist church starts in its new worship home and seeks to use its former assets to the greatest advantage, Horndon has been able to replace its Church chairs and some tables and Zion Hall Mission has been the grateful recipient of a set of Bibles.



In all this we remind ourselves that 'church' is the people of God, not the building nor the denomination. We worship God wherever we are both in our services and our deeds and we are united in God's love, mercy and forgiveness.

Lent And Easter at Linford

There will be art and craft activities, music and refreshments. There may be some Hot Cross buns! If possible, please come in an Easter Bonnet as there will be an Easter Bonnet parade. There may be prizes! No charge but donations for refreshments welcome.

Ian Brown will be taking our celebratory service on Easter Sunday. There may be cake involved!

On Good Friday we remove the objects from the Cross. On Easter Sunday, for the first time, we 'festooned' the Cross with flowers, some from our own gardens. Some of the flowers were taken to people who could not attend because of illness, or taken home to put on display over Easter.


NKY FINGERS

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DEAR FAMILY

The stories of Jesus' death and resurrection can feel like heavy topics to talk about with your children. Unlike the joyous baby-in-a-manger stories you told at Christmas, the stories that are bookended by a Palm Sunday parade and an Easter Sunday resurrection include betrayal, death, confusion, and deep sadness. But they also show Jesus' character as the loving, humble, servant King who welcomes all to the table, and they help us realize the depth of Christ's sacrifice, preparing our hearts and minds to experience Easter awe.

God's Big Easter Story: A Holy Week Journey for Families is based on the Holy Week section in our popular *God's Big Story* cards boxed set (available from <u>FaithAliveResources.org</u>). It is designed to provide your family with a simple, meaningful way to grow in faith together as you remember the events leading up to Jesus' death and celebrate the hope we have in Jesus' resurrection.

What Is Holy Week?

Beginning on Palm Sunday and ending with the three days that mark Jesus' trial, death, and resurrection, Holy Week is a time to remember Jesus' journey to the cross—and beyond. A lot happens from Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem to his appearance outside his tomb. Reading these stories throughout Holy Week gives us a chance to walk with Jesus in the last moments of his life and to experience the miracle of his resurrection.

Making the Symbols Set for God's Big Easter Story

Here's what you need:

- A printed copy of the pathway found on page 3 of this document
- A printed copy of the **story symbols** (if you don't have them already, download them from <u>DwellCurriculum.org/Home</u> in black and white or in color).
- *Tip*: You can print the symbols on **sticker paper** if you want to stick them directly on the pathway. Or to make them reusable year after year, stick them on wooden circles instead.

How to Use the Devotions

There's no right or wrong way to use these devotions. For example, you could read one each day during Holy Week, adding a new symbol to the pathway each day to mark the progression toward Easter. Alternatively, you could combine some of the stories and read them over a few days. Or maybe this year you're only able to read a few of the stories together. That's OK.

We've provided NIV Scripture references for each story, but feel free to read the stories from a children's story Bible if that works best for your kids.

We invite you to use the four steps below as a framework for your time together.

BREATHE: Calm your head, heart, and hands as together you slowly breathe in . . . and out. (Adjust the length of this quiet time according to your children's attention spans.)

READ: Spend time in God's story by reading the suggested passage from the Bible or from a children's story Bible. Some days the selections are longer than others. One way to keep kids of all ages engaged is by including them in the telling of the story. You can invite pre-readers to make up an action to do each time they hear a particular word or name. Assign readers a section of the story to read aloud, or have them read the lines of a character as you narrate the story.

WONDER: Use the questions to reflect on the story. We've provided you with "wondering questions" because they work well with all ages, they have no right or wrong answers, and they result in deeper thinking about God and about the lives of the people in the story. Encourage kids to use their imaginations as you wonder together about these stories. You might want to end this time by asking, "What do you wonder about this story?"

PRAY: Close your time with prayer using the provided suggestions or your own words and ideas.


Easy Extra Ideas

Looking for other ways to engage with the stories during Holy Week? Try one of these ideas:

- Use LEGO[™] or other blocks to build something featured in each day's story.
- Create a resurrection garden like this one (tinyurl.com/DwellatHomeGarden) from the blog Confessions of a Homeschooler.
- Make or purchase hot cross buns to eat on Good Friday.
- Make a colorful sign or banner with the words "Alleluia! Jesus Is Alive!" written on it. Hide it somewhere for your children to
- discover on Easter Sunday as part of your celebration. Or have your child make the banner and then hide it for *you* to find!
 Celebrate Jesus' resurrection by singing or listening to a favorite Easter song together.

GOD'S BIG EASTER STORY

DAILY DEVOTIONS



PALM SUNDAY PARADE

BREATHE: Calm your head, heart, and hands as you slowly breathe in . . . and out.

READ: Matthew 21:1-11

WONDER: What would it be like to be in the crowd that welcomed Jesus to Jerusalem? What would you have said or done if you had been there?

PRAY: Dear Jesus, like the people on Palm Sunday, we praise you. Thank you for coming to be our King and establishing your kingdom. Help us to serve you in it. Amen.



THROWING OUT THE MONEY CHANGERS

BREATHE: Calm your head, heart, and hands as you slowly breathe in . . . and out.

READ: Matthew 21:12-17

WONDER: What does this story show you about Jesus? What words do you think the people Jesus healed would use to describe him? How do you think the children's faces looked as they shouted, "Hosanna to the Son of David!"

PRAY: The children ran and shouted "Hosanna!" Use this praise litany as your prayer today, responding with a loud "Hosanna!" after each phrase (run around and shout it if you like):

Jesus, you are the great and awesome King. *Hosanna!* Jesus, all glory and honor belong to you. *Hosanna!* Jesus, you are the King—then, now, and forever. *Hosanna!*



THE FOOT WASHING

BREATHE: Calm your head, heart, and hands as you slowly breathe in . . . and out.

READ: John 13:1-17

WONDER: Imagine how the water would feel on your tired feet. What would it be like to have someone so important serve you by washing your smelly, dirty feet? Why do you think Jesus told the disciples to wash one another's feet? How do you serve others?

PRAY: Think of all the people who serve you—family members, coaches, teachers, and community helpers. Offer a popcorn prayer of thanks for these people, jumping in and naming them whenever you are ready. End your prayer by asking God to help you serve others too.



THE LAST SUPPER

BREATHE: Calm your head, heart, and hands as you slowly breathe in . . . and out.

READ: Luke 22:7-23

WONDER: Do you remember the words Jesus said about the bread and the cup? (If not, reread verses 19 and 20 together.) Wonder how the Lord's Supper celebration at your church is like the special meal Jesus had with his disciples. Why might Jesus have used food and drink to remind us how much he loves us? What do you wonder about the Lord's Supper?

PRAY: Dear Jesus, thank you for giving us a way to remember your sacrifice for us and to remind us how much you love us. We love you too, Lord! Amen.



A SAD NIGHT

BREATHE: Calm your head, heart, and hands as you slowly breathe in . . . and out.

READ: Luke 22:39-62

WONDER: Wonder why the disciples fell asleep. How do you think Jesus felt when all his friends were too tired to support him? Imagine that you're Peter, a follower and friend of Jesus. After Jesus was arrested, what emotions would you be feeling? Why do you think Peter denied Jesus? Why do you think Peter cried?

PRAY: Think about a time when you did something that made Jesus sad. Begin a family prayer with "Jesus, I made you sad when. . . ." Then give everyone a moment to silently talk to Jesus. End the prayer with "Thank you, Jesus, for forgiving us. Thank you for always loving us, no matter what. We're so glad you never leave us or get too tired for us! Amen."



JESUS DIES

BREATHE: Calm your head, heart, and hands as you slowly breathe in . . . and out.

READ: John 19:14-30

WONDER: What do you wonder about Jesus dying on the cross? How does this story make you feel?

PRAY: Draw a simple cross. Practice holding up the cross and having everyone say, "Thank you, Jesus." Hold it up after each sentence in this prayer, saying the response together:

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JESUS IS BURIED

BREATHE: Calm your head, heart, and hands as you slowly breathe in . . . and out.

READ: John 19:38-42

WONDER: When Jesus was alive, Joseph of Arimathea was afraid to tell others he was a follower of Jesus. But after Jesus died, Joseph asked Pilate if he could bury Jesus' body. Wonder why Joseph wanted to do this for Jesus. What emotions do you think Joseph and Nicodemus were feeling as they buried Jesus? Where do you think the other disciples were on this day? How do you think they were feeling? How does this part of the story make you feel? Create your own symbol for this day in the blank circle above. (If each person would like to make their own symbol, trace the circle and make extras.)

PRAY: Practice making the signs for "Jesus" (with hands open, touch the tip of the middle finger of one hand to the palm of your other hand; repeat on the opposite hand) and for "Thank you" (touch the fingertips of your dominant hand to your chin; then extend your hand forward with the palm up). Sign "Jesus" and "Thank you" as you read the following prayer:

Dear Jesus, you taught us how to be servants to each other. Thank you! Jesus, you suffered in the garden when your friends weren't there for you. Thank you! Jesus, you let your enemies arrest you and hurt you. Thank you! Jesus, your friends ran away and even said they didn't know you. But you didn't complain. Thank you! We are sorry that your friends ran away. We are sorry that you felt so alone. We are sorry that you enemies hurt you. We are sorry that you suffered so much for us. Jesus, we love you. Thank you for loving us! Amen.

BREATHE: Calm your head, heart, and hands as you slowly breathe in ... and out.

READ: John 20:1-18

WONDER: What do you think Jesus' friends thought when they saw that his tomb was empty? Why do you think Jesus' friend Mary Magdalene didn't realize at first that she was talking to Jesus? What would you have done when you realized Jesus was alive again? Who would you run to tell?

PRAY: Celebrate Jesus' resurrection by echoing this prayer together (repeating each phrase as it's read):

Jesus, you are Lord. Jesus, you are our hope. Jesus, you won the victory over death. Jesus, we jump for joy because you are alive! Amen.

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Women in God's story

There are 93 women who speak in the Bible, 49 of whom are named. These women speak a total of 14,056 words collectively; roughly 1.1 percent of the total words in scripture. Some of these biblical women are prominent and well-known, like Jesus' mother, Mary, who utters just 191 words. Mary Magdalene says 61 words, while Sarah, the wife of Abraham, says 141. Yet many of the female characters have largely been silenced over the centuries.

For every Eve, Tamar, Rahab, Ruth, Bathsheba, Mary, Lydia and Pricilla there are many simple referred to as the wife, daughter or mother of. Many are unnamed such as the woman at the well, the Syrophonecian women wanting crumbs from under the table, the woman caught in adultery (no mention of the man caught in the same act), the widow in the temple with her mite or the woman suffering with the issue of blood.

Many might seem insignificant, marginal figures and yet they are central to God's plans. Using this crossword let's reflect on some of these women.





- The Fourth Act of the Book of Ruth


If this is something you would like to be part of, consider offering to facilitating a guided conversation (i.e., chairing/leading) one of the chapters of the book.
