

From the Superintendent

Hello Everyone,

'On the evening of that first day of the week, when the disciples were together, with the doors locked for fear of the Jewish leaders, Jesus came and stood among them and said, 'Peace be with you.' (John 20: 19)

In this season of Easter I have found myself being drawn to these words and to the setting of Jesus first appearance to his disciples. I try to imagine the emotional, psychological and physical state these disciples were in, reeling from the shockingly unjust accusations and trial of their Master and Teacher, followed by his brutal execution on the cross. I imagine the depth of fear they must have felt and how each sought a hiding place as far away from Jesus as possible, and the burning sense of shame and remorse they must have known each time they thought about how they had abandoned Jesus.

And now, as they gradually emerge from those hiding places they come together, still seeking from each other a sense of shared identity, of meaning and solidarity. Here in this dank and dim room with the doors firmly locked, together, yet still traumatized. Then suddenly in this gloom stands Jesus, radiant, full of life and light. 'Peace be with you', his first words to them. The words he spoke, 'Peace be with you', might not have sounded anything out of the ordinary. 'Peace be with you'; 'Shalom Aleichem' was the standard greeting of that language and culture; much greater impact was to see him who was dead, now alive, in the flesh and speaking to them. How awesome was that?

But as Jesus repeats this ordinary greeting sufficiently enough times the deeper relevance of the message begins to register. **Peace be with you.** In the midst of all their trauma, guilt and amazement Jesus offers peace. Our world seems to be in such turbulence currently, many are the changes happening, often concurrently. Long-standing ideologies, practices, beliefs and standards which have served society for several decades, however imperfectly, are rapidly being dismantled. At the personal level, many are feeling the pinch from the rising cost of living, from illnesses of themselves or loved ones, relationships are becoming increasingly brittle and tense – all of which might leave us feeling unsettled, disquieted and somewhat low-spirited. It is against this backdrop that Jesus word of greeting drops to the modernday disciple: **Peace be with you.**



I believe our critical mission is to seek out how to make this peace work for us in each of our contexts – in our personal lives, in our busy jobs, within our church fellowship, in our local community – anywhere and everywhere. To carry peace within us, like the veritable treasure in clay-pots and through the cracks left by former traumas, allow peace to filter through to others we meet. In John 14: 27, Jesus clarifies the peace he gives, "My peace I give you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid."

May that Peace be yours and may it be mine today, tomorrow and forever. The Peace of the Lord be with you!

Easter Biscuit for Pentecost and Beyond



Easter biscuits are a delightful tradition, especially in the UK, with their origins steeped in history and symbolism. These sweet, spiced treats, often flavoured with cinnamon, nutmeg, and sometimes currants, are thought to have ties to religious practices and seasonal celebrations. The round shape of the biscuits is sometimes said to represent the stone that was rolled away from Jesus' tomb.

Historically, Easter biscuits were also associated with hospitality and celebration, often baked and

shared with family and friends during the festive season. In some regions, they were even given as a gift to people attending Easter church services.

Here's a classic recipe for traditional Easter biscuits, a delightful treat with warm spices and a subtle citrus twist:

Ingredients:

- ●125g unsalted butter, softened
- ●125g caster sugar
- ●1 egg yolk
- Zest of 1 lemon
- ●200g plain flour
- 1 tsp mixed spice
- A pinch of salt
- ●50g currants or raisins (optional)
- Granulated sugar (for topping)

Instructions:

- 1. Preheat your oven to 180°C (160°C fan)/Gas Mark 4. Line a baking tray with parchment paper.
- 2. In a bowl, cream the butter and caster sugar together until light and fluffy.
- 3. Beat in the egg yolk and lemon zest until well combined.
- 4. Sift the flour, mixed spice, and salt into the bowl. Mix together to form a dough. If you're adding currants, fold them in now.
- 5. Roll out the dough on a lightly floured surface to about 5mm thickness. Use a biscuit cutter to shape the biscuits.
- 6. Place the biscuits onto the prepared tray and sprinkle granulated sugar generously on top.
- 7. Bake for 10–12 minutes, or until the biscuits are golden. Let them cool on a wire rack.
